Touch-A-Truck Rolling Back on Sept. 22

Richmond Community College is bringing back the big wheels for Touch-A-Truck, an event that entertained hundreds of children and their families last fall. The event is a showcase of different types of trucks, machines and heavy equipment from all career fields.

“This is a great hands-on experience for kids, and it exposes them to different careers and trades,” said Janet Sims, Dean of Allied Health and Human Services at RichmondCC.

Touch-A-Truck will be held from 4 to 6:30 p.m. Friday, Sept.

22, in the parking lot of the Cole Auditorium on the Hamlet Campus of RichmondCC.

Last year, Touch-A-Truck included a SWAT vehicle, crane, dump truck, tractor, trash truck, tow truck, logging truck, fire trucks, police cars, ambulances, forklift and other career specific vehicles.

Instructors from RichmondCC’s Electric Lineman program also gave kids rides in the bucket of the lineman truck.

“The kids get to explore each vehicle, sit in the driver’s seat and generally just marvel at all

these huge trucks, while also thinking about what they may want to do when they grow up,” Sims said. “We will also have information available about our college programs that lead to these careers, so we can show people that they don’t have to go far from home for great careers. RichmondCC has a lot to offer.”

There is no cost for admission for this event.

Food will be available for purchase from several mobile food trucks, and children will be able to participate in other games and activities.

The individualized nature of RichmondCC's adult education programs allows students to progress at their own pace toward successful completion of their last high school equivalency exam or adult high school coursework.



"We tell our students their job is to show up and do the work. Our job is to help them meet their goal so they will be ready for their next steps. Hopefully, those next steps will be to continue their education here at Richmond Community College," said Nicole Worley, Dean of Adult Education.

All High School Equivalency and Adult High School classes are tuition-free.

"Thanks to generous donations made to the College's Foundation, Richmond Community College has been able to help offset the cost of GED® and HiSET® testing fees for many students," Worley said.

Starting this year, RichmondCC will hold a second graduation ceremony in December for those completing the Adult Education programs in the latter part of the year.

Leviner. “I know a lot of good police officers and deputies that I look up to, and I told myself that I wanted to be one, too.”

Leviner was hired by the Hamlet Police Department, and he hopes to eventually work his way up to a detective position.

Dylon Goodwin was already working in the public safety field as a firefighter and EMT. He had heard good things about RichmondCC’s BLET program, so he decided to make the change to law enforcement. He will be working for the Richmond County Sheriff’s Office and hopes to become an arson investigator.

Amiracle Leak was one of four cadets in the BLET program with a military background. She was working full time with the National Guard.

“The public service field is something I always wanted to do and be a help to the community,” she said. “I also really want to work with a K-9 unit.”

Travis Griffin served in the Army, but he also has experience with underwater welding and commercial diving. He was enrolled in another BLET program before transferring into RichmondCC’s program.

“Out of the two BLET programs that I’ve been in, this one is much more professional,” Griffin said.

Seanessey O’Dowd retired from the Army as a master sergeant from 1st Special Forces Command and started a martial arts academy and gym. However, with all the active shooter incidents and having four kids of his own in school, he felt called to serve again on a team and make an impact.

“Isaiah 6:8 says, ‘Whom shall I send? Send me.’ And that helped me see I still have more to give,”



Over the course of 17 weeks, cadets in the BLET program at RichmondCC learn about law, court procedures, investigations, firearms, tactical driving, emergency response, and ethics and community relations.

O’Dowd said.

Everyone in the class had some type of job prior to BLET, whether it was working in fast-food, driving a school bus or working in a warehouse or outside in the elements. All were seeking a meaningful career.

“I’ve always looked up to law enforcement since I was a young boy. I have been wanting to become one and serve those who need help,” said Jose Jaramillo.

Jaramillo was hired by the Wadesboro Police Department to be a patrol officer. In fact, all the cadets in the class were hired by law enforcement, thanks to the director of RichmondCC’s BLET program, Keith Thomas.

“He went above and beyond making sure we had all the resources we needed to succeed.

The director was always there to coach, teach and mentor us every step of the way,” said O’Dowd.

“Not only did he assemble a team of true professionals and subject matter experts to instruct the class, but he also went out of his way to make sure everyone in the program was hired by a law enforcement agency before graduation.”

Consensus among the cadets was how well the program is structured.

“I would recommend RichmondCC’s BLET program because it is very organized and the director is top notch,” said

The next BLET class begins July 17, but another one is scheduled for January 2024. The 17-week program uses mandated topics and methods of instruction from the N.C. 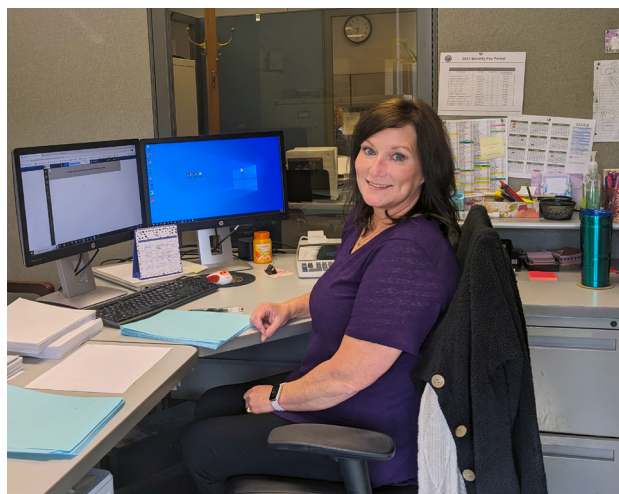

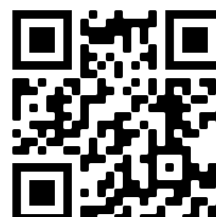
