Comments: This is to serve as notification that UNC Charlotte has updated and revised the previous 2+2 Articulation Agreement(s) between the Child and Family Development Program (CHFD) and the North Carolina Community College System (NCCCS) Early Childhood (EDU) programs. UNC Charlotte's Child and Family Development Program

Program Goals:

Prepare graduates to:

- apply understanding of various stages of growth and development in the context of evolving cultural, community, and societal systems;
- apply evidence-based knowledge and practices in the field;
- utilize screening and assessment procedures;
- design, adapt, implement, and evaluate individually appropriate learning environments for young children from birth through kindergarten;
- collaborate effectively with families and professionals to provide support for children who are culturally, linguistically, and ability diverse; and
- meet the North Carolina Professional Teaching Standards and the ten Interstate New Teachers Assessment and Support Consortium (INTASC).

Child and Family Development Undergraduate Degree Programs:

Bachelor of Arts: Prepares students to be outstanding professionals in a variety of careers focused on families and young children. Specifically, the program leading to the B.A. degree prepares graduates to work in educational and related settings that serve infants, toddlers, preschoolers, kindergartners with and without disabilities, and their families. The program prepares graduates for the Standard Professional 1 (SP1) Professional Educator's License in birthkindergarten (B-K) education.

Minor in Child and Family

Development: Provides opportunities to develop an overview of early learning and development, an understanding of early childhood issues, insights into the role of families as well as the role of child care in experiences outside of the home. Students must complete six courses with a GPA of at least 2.5 and have an overall GPA of at least 2.5.

Admission Requirements:

- * Completion of at least 30 semester hours of coursework;
- * Overall GPA of at least 2.5;
- * A grade of "C" or better in EDUC 2100 and SPED 2100;
- * Acceptable scores of all three parts of the Praxis I (Reading, Writing, and Mathematics); and
- * Admission application through the College's Office of Teacher Education Advising, Licensure, and Recruitment (TEALR) office.
