COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is a survey of American history from pre-history through the Civil War era. Topics include the migrations to the Americas, the colonial and revolutionary periods, the development of the Republic, and the Civil War. Upon completion, students should be able to analyze significant political, socioeconomic, and cultural developments in early American history

- 8. Identify the effects of slavery and how that and other causes led to the Civil War.
- 9. Discuss the events leading to the Civil War, the social impacts of the war, and the significant outcome.
- 10. Analyze specific events in America's history during this period in structured written responses.
