MERRY CHRISTMAS - A LITTLE HISTORY

Ever wonder where the phrase "Merry Christmas" comes from?

Merry Christmas traces as far back as 1534. A letter from imprisoned English Catholic Bishop John Fisher to Henry VIII's Chief Minister Thomas Cromwell had the phrase "Merry Christmas" in it. Bishop Fisher had been held in the Tower of London prison for eight months and asked in his letter for clothing and food. He closed his letter with "And this our Lord God send you a merry Christmas".

The phrase was also used in the 16th century English carol "We Wish You a Merry Christmas."

Merry Christmas became popular in 1843 when Charles Dicken's *A Christmas Carol* was published. Merry Christmas appeared in the story 21 times. That same year the phrase also appeared on commercial Christmas cards.

The Federal Work Study (FWS) program is a need-based program which provides jobs for students with financial need, allowing them to earn money to help pay education expenses. The program stimulates and promotes part-time employment for students in need of earning money to help finance their educational expenses.
